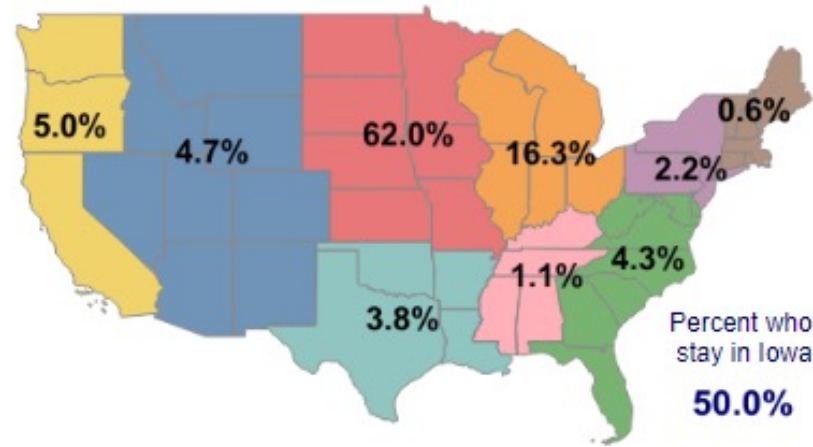

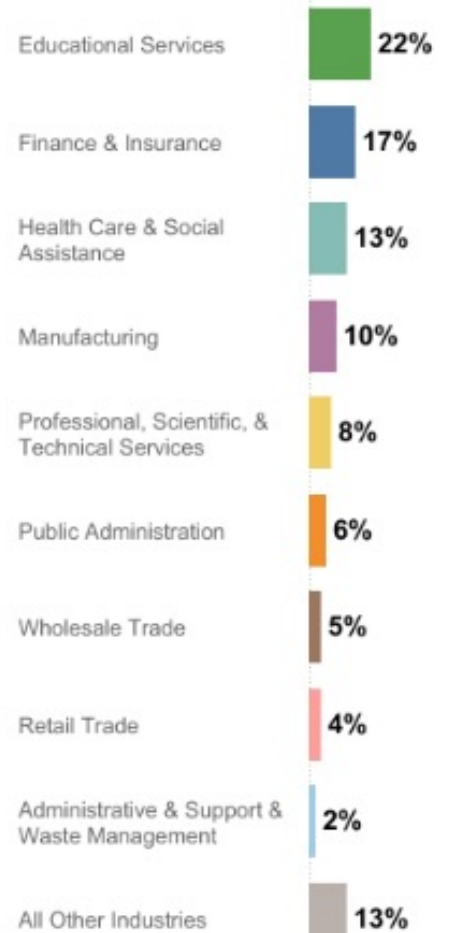

Iowa industry sectors employing bachelor's degree recipients in All Instructional Programs 10 years after graduation % by industry sector

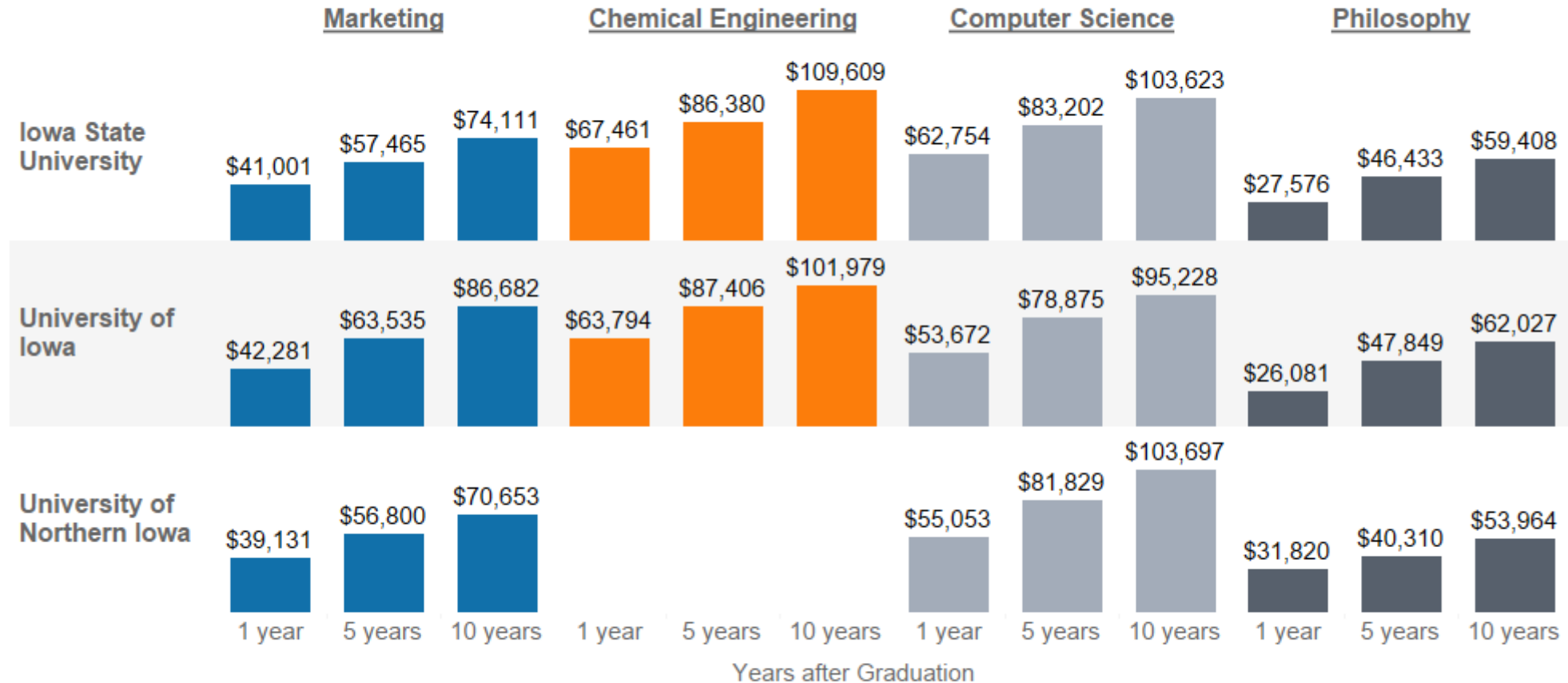


Median wages for a bachelor's degree in All Instructional Programs

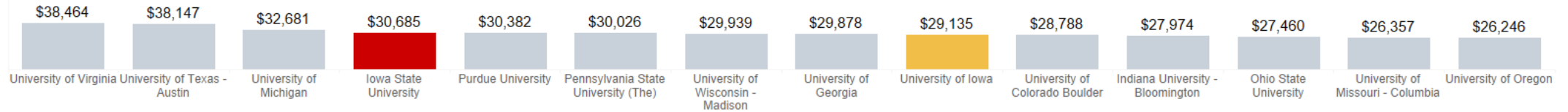
Iowa Graduates with Bachelor's Degrees have Good Jobs with Good Wages by Major



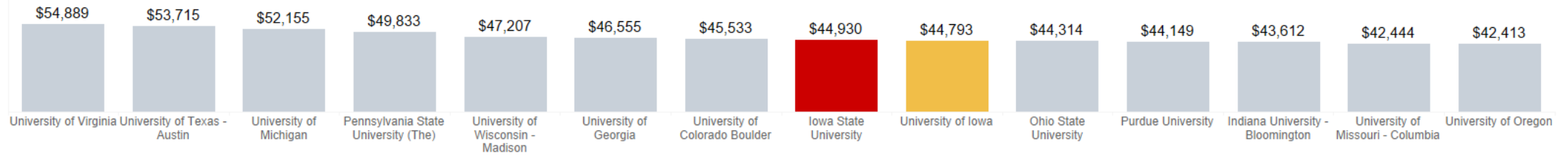

National Median Wage Outcomes for Full-time Employed Bachelors Degree Recipients in **English Language and Literature/Letters** 1 year after degree

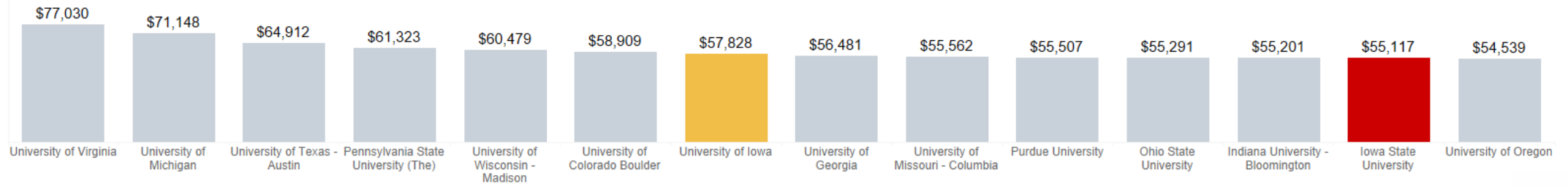

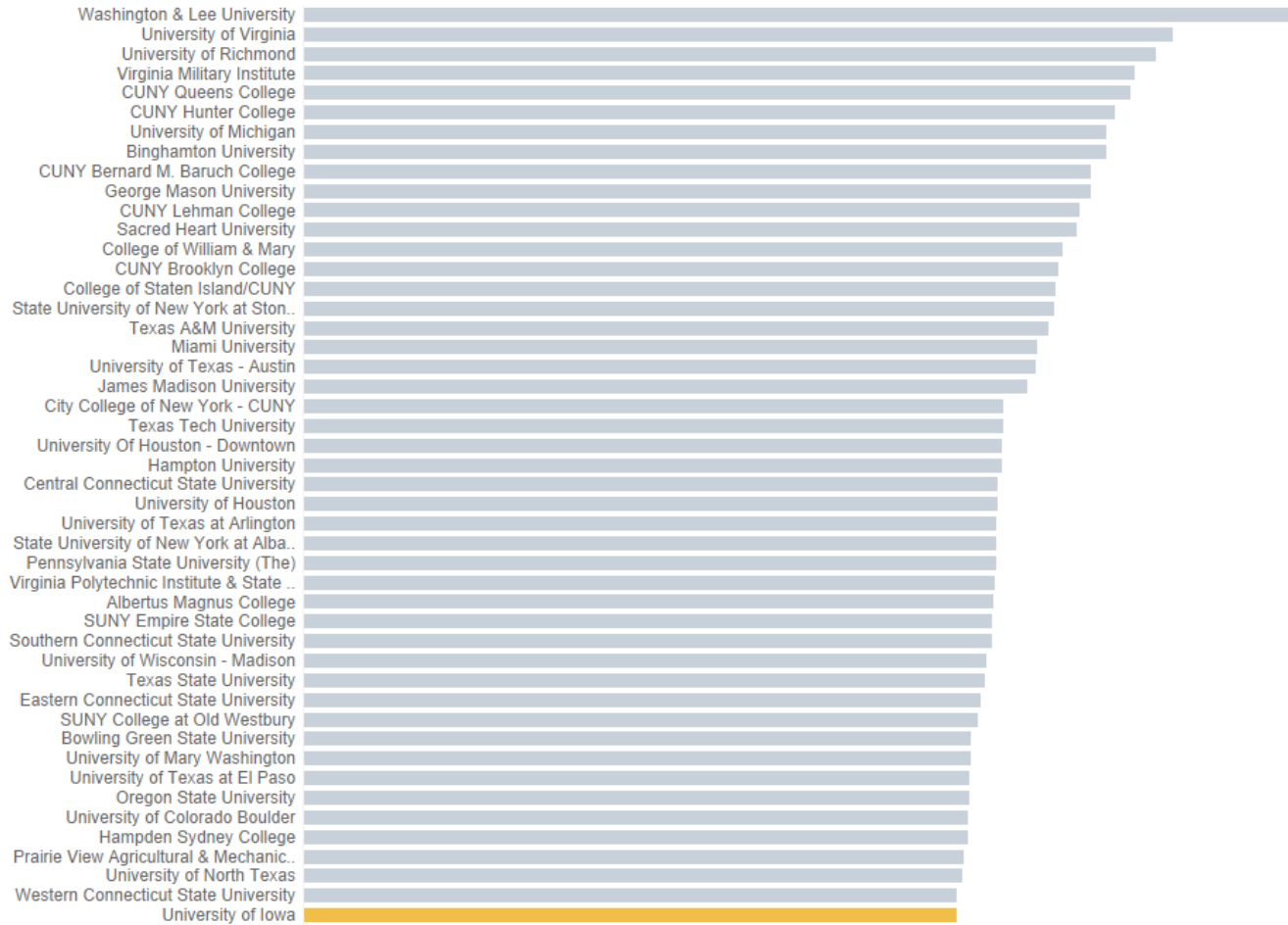

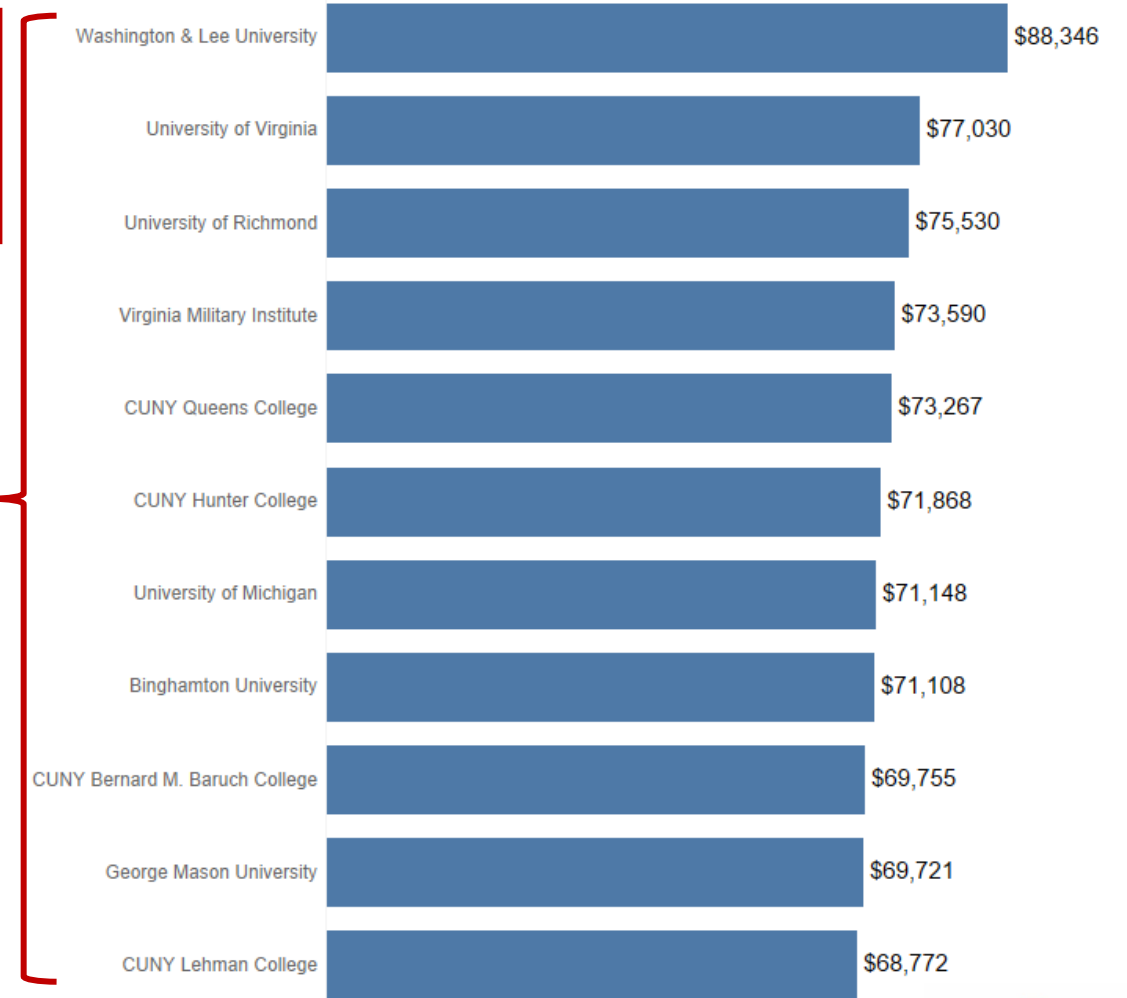
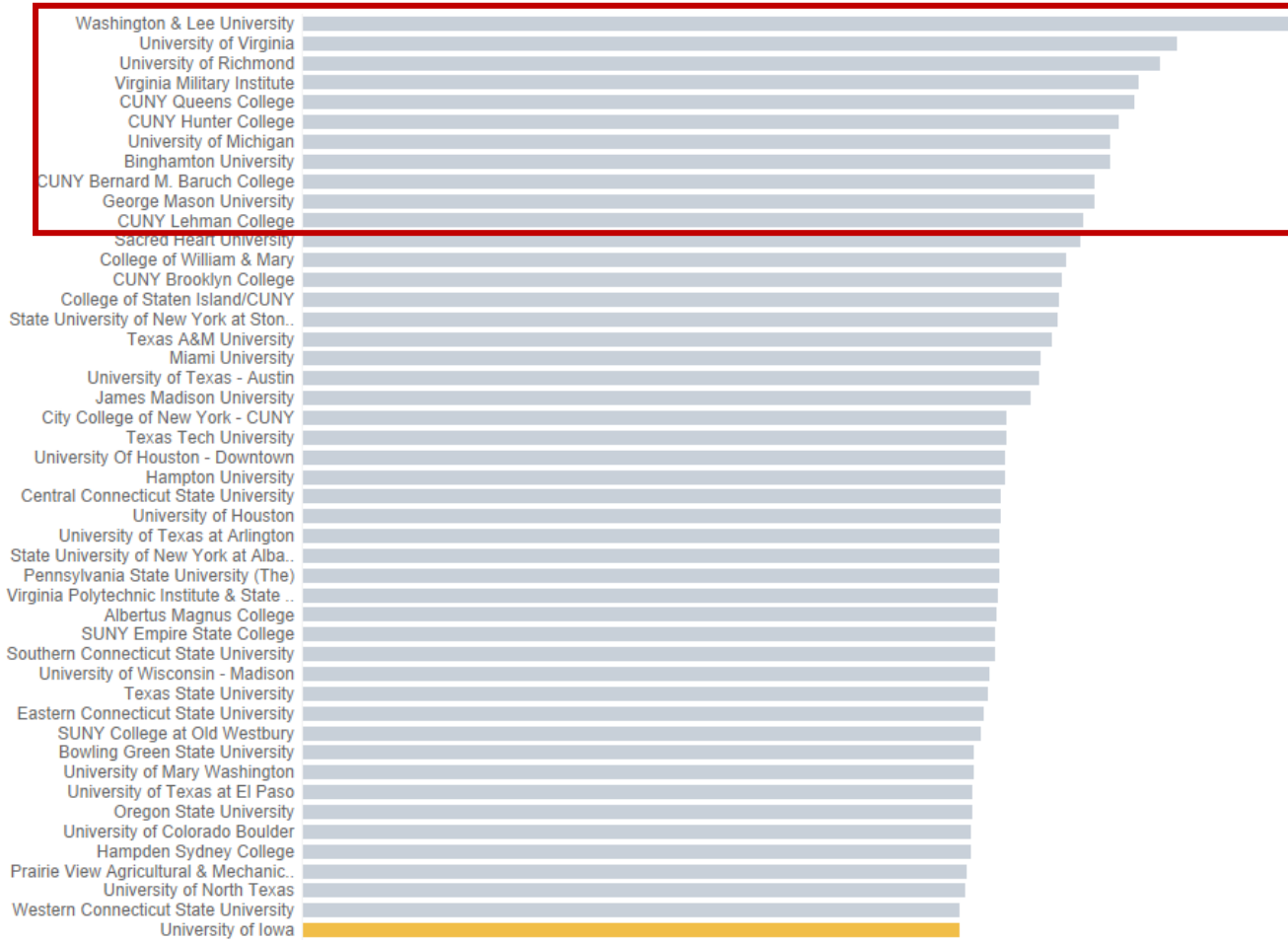

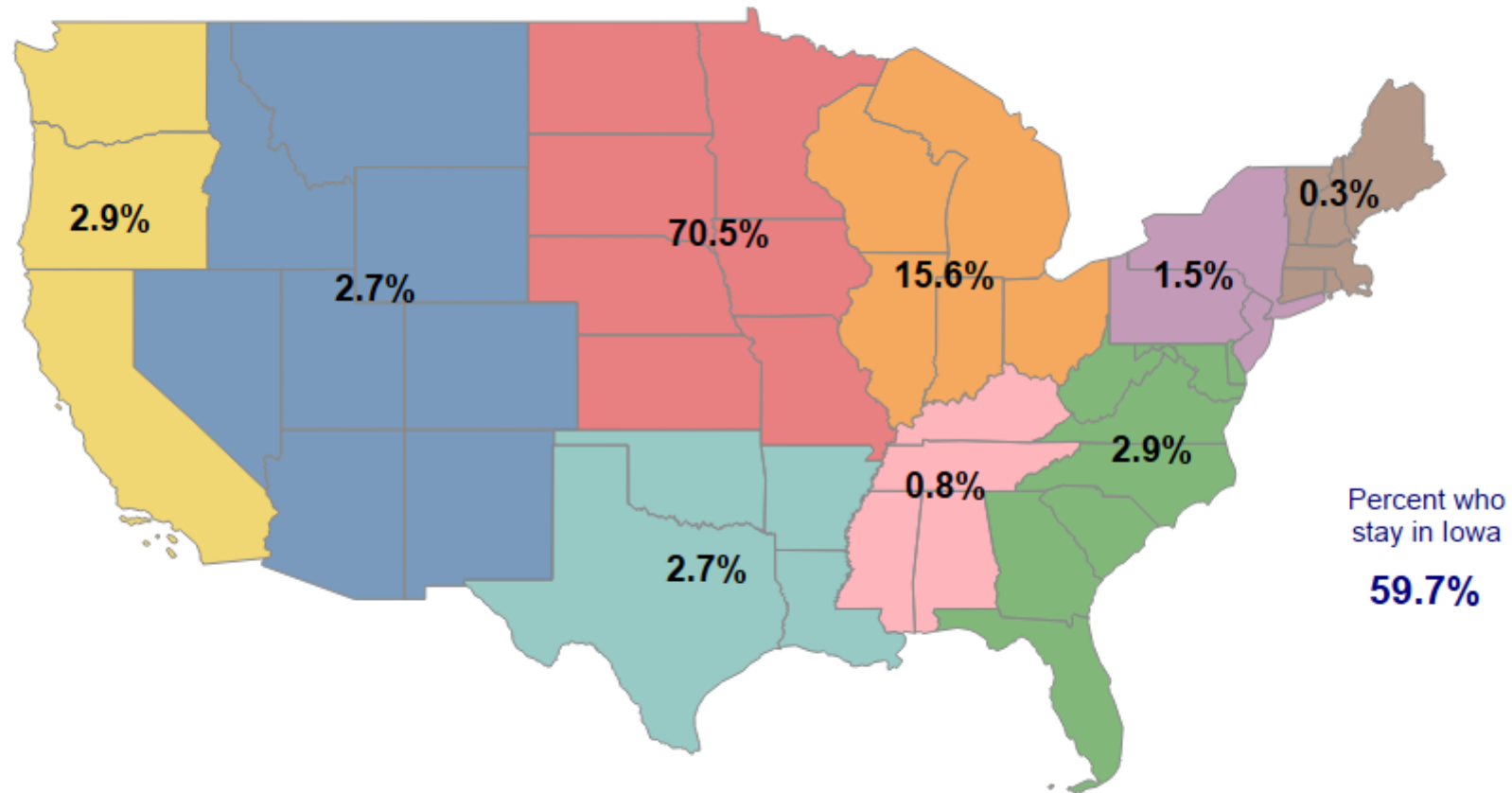
National Median Wage Outcomes for Full-time Employed Bachelors Degree Recipients in **English Language and Literature/Letters** 10 years after degree

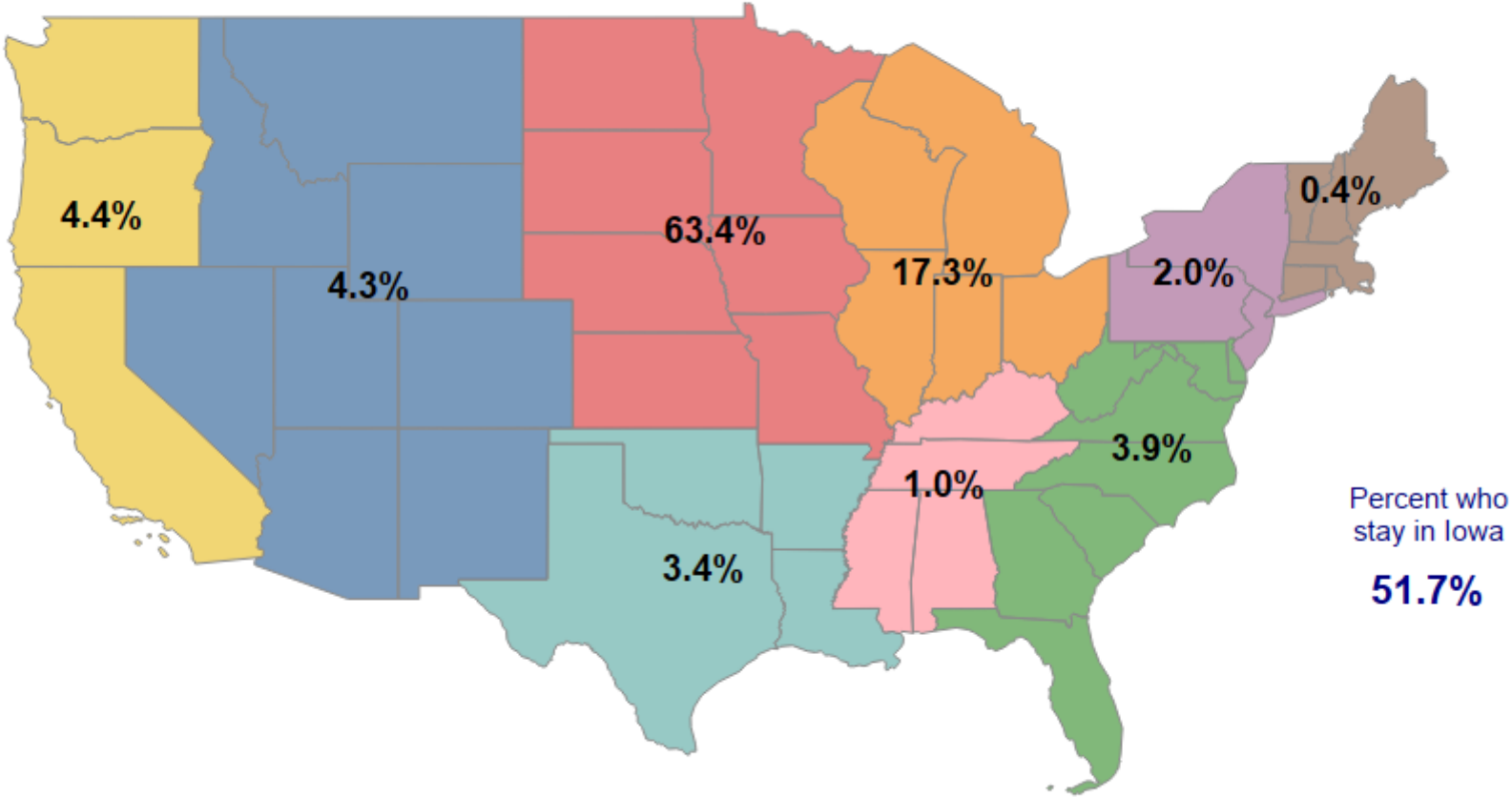


Where do Iowa **Baccalaureate Degree** Recipients Work One Year after Graduation?



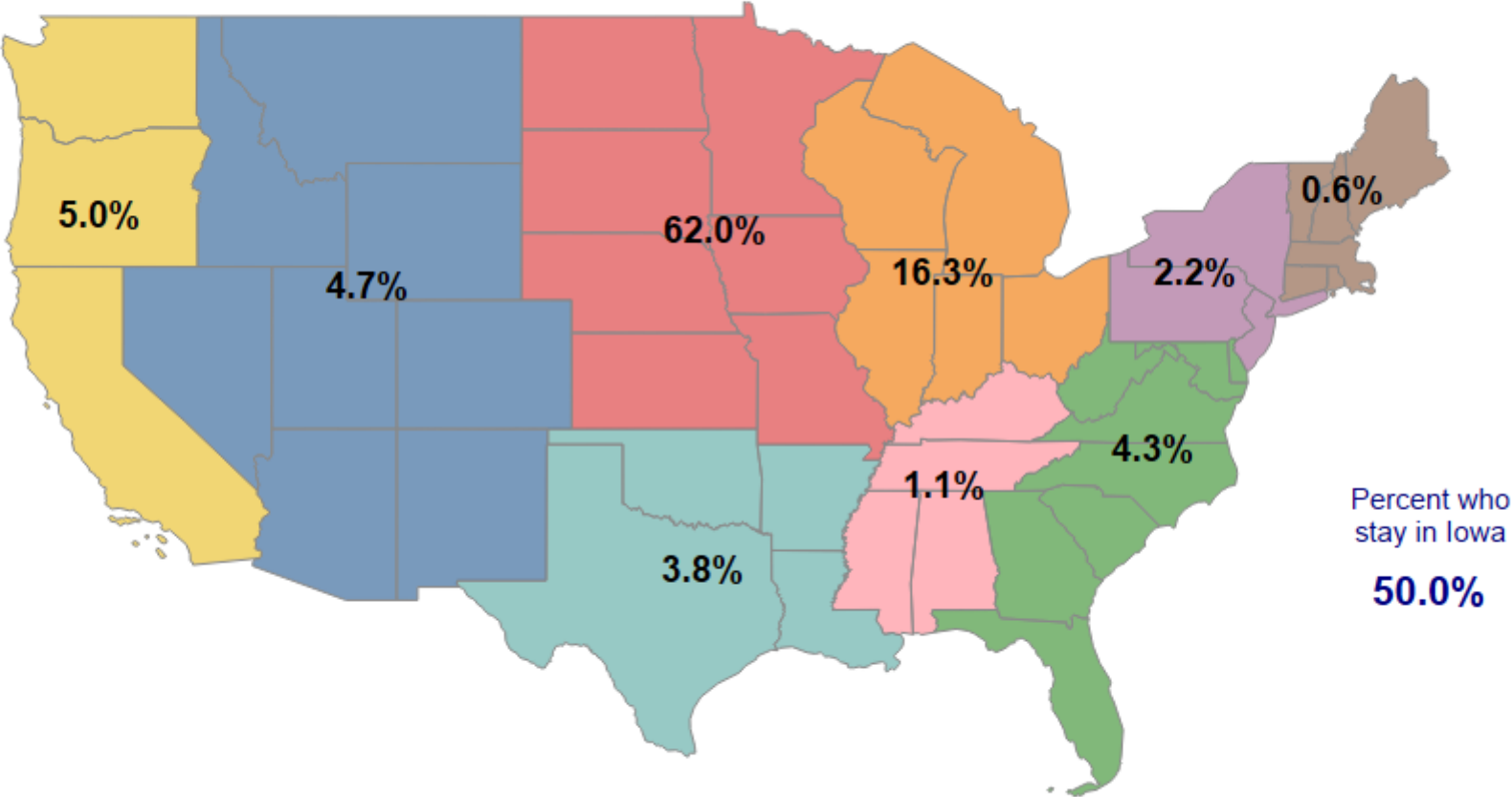

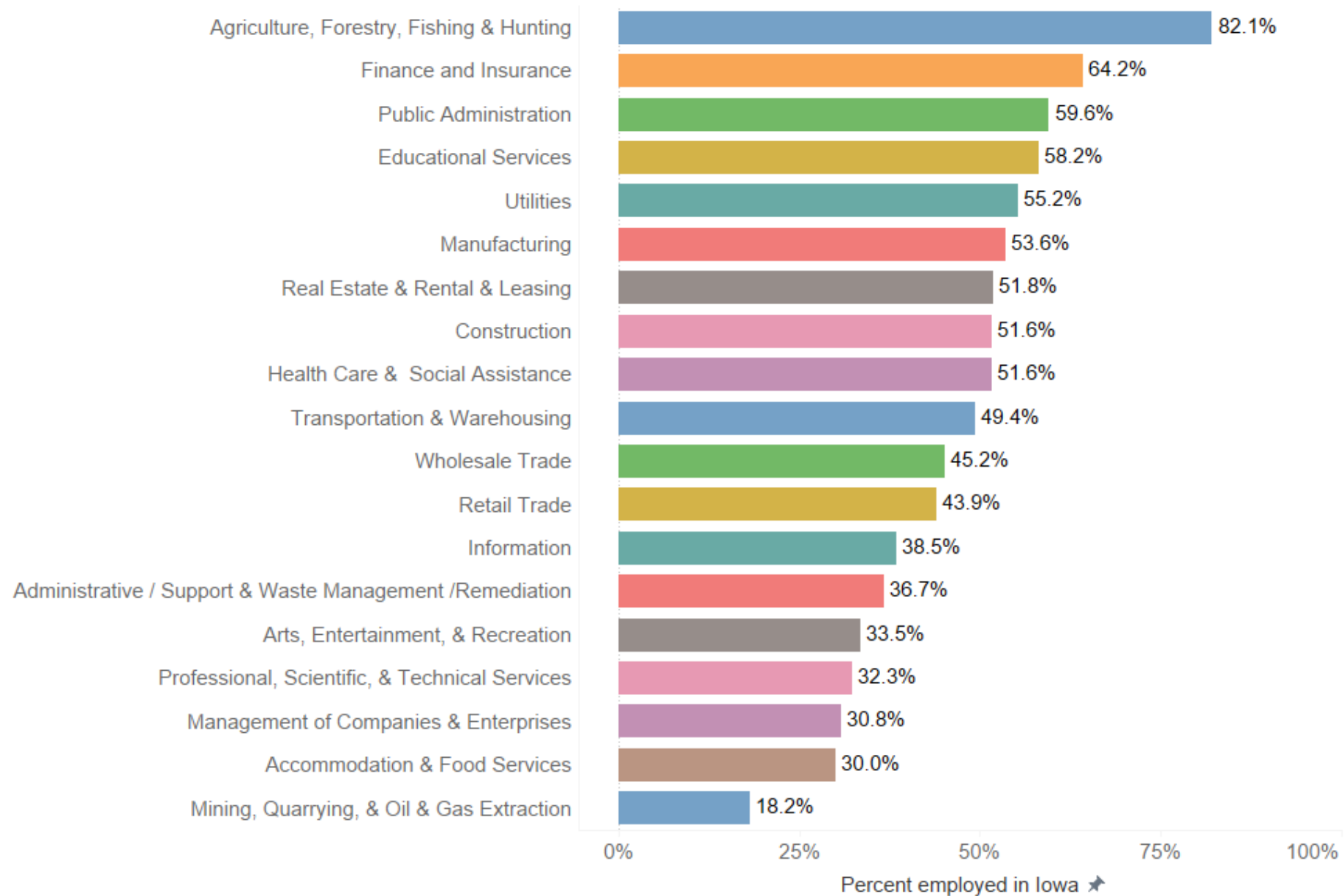
Where do Iowa Baccalaureate Degree Recipients Work 10 Years after Graduation?

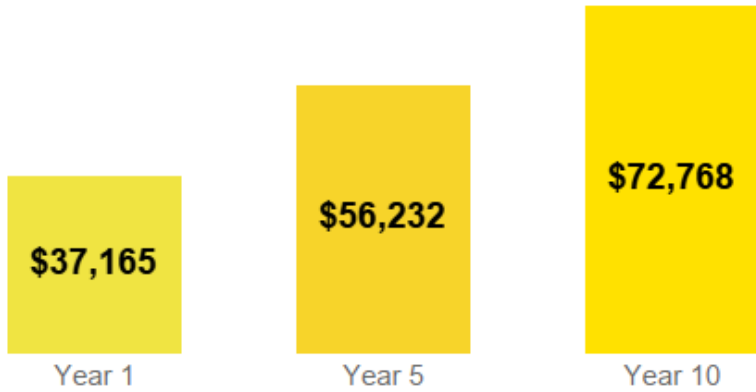
